TRIUMPH OUT OF TRAGEDY NEW LIFE OUT OF DESTRUCTION 50 YEARS AFTER THE MONTICELLO TORNADO APRIL 3, 1974 REMEMBERED

A tornado moved through downtown Monticello at 5:17 PM on Wednesday, April 3, 1974. The Monticello Community was forever changed because of it. When talking about the history of Monticello it is often described as before the tornado or after the tornado. When reflecting upon the tornado 50 years later, one person said it brought unity to the community as people worked together, neighbor helping neighbor. Another person credited the tornado recovery with the development of a servant's heart. There are many personal experiences shared by those who experienced the tornado and our community's recovery, however, in this space we are going to share some memories of how our congregation reached out in love during the time of recovery and rebuilding.

-Thursday morning, April 4, the Salvation Army reached out to the pastor of the church, Rev. Ed Helm, about using the United Methodist Church as the hub of their operations. The church had sustained minimal damage, only losing the glass out of one section of the large north stained-glass window and some damage to the steeple. The building was safe to be used and by Thursday evening, they were open for business in the church basement.

-The Salvation Army was in the church basement for about 2 ½ to 3 weeks before moving their operations to a warehouse located on Market Street. During their time in the church basement, they estimated serving about 75,000 meals. By Saturday, April 6 they were serving about 5000 meals a day to workers and families in the community. There are memories of going to the church every night for several weeks to eat their evening meal. There was always a pot of soup on the stove, just waiting for someone who needed something to eat to show up. When the church opened as the Salvation Army command center, the church did not have electricity. They could use the gas stove in the kitchen and many people set up their grills outside the church to help with cooking duties. Large refrigerator trucks were brought to the church to keep food cold until power was restored. Volunteers from the church and community showed up day after day for weeks to do what they could to help in the recovery effort. CONTINUED INSIDE.

PASTORAL LEADERSHIP....ITINERACY....SUCCESSION PLAN....

There are two basic ways that churches receive a new pastor. One way is through a call system where a congregation is responsible for finding, interviewing, and making an offer to the pastor they would like to hire, often assisted by denominational leadership. The other common way, which is the way used by the United Methodist Church, is called itineracy. In an itinerate system, the Bishop appoints or sends a pastor to serve in a particular church and community.

In the early days of Methodism the pastors were called circuit riders. As the settlers moved west in the United States, so did the Methodist circuit riders. In the early days of Methodism a pastor was sent into a community to establish a gathering for believers to come together. A pastor might be assigned to twelve or thirteen different communities. The circuit rider would show up about once every three months to preach, meet with leaders of the congregation to see how things were going and to serve communion. Because of the way Methodist circuit riders were appointed to establish faith communities across the United States, there was a time when there was a United Methodist Church in every zip code of our nation.

The days of the circuit rider passed over time and a pastor was assigned to a single church where the pastor also took up residence in the community. The church would provide a parsonage for the pastor and his/her family to live. In the itinerate ministry, pastors were (and are) appointed to a church, one year at a time.

My mother remembers attending annual conference to hear whether their pastor was returning for another year or whether they were receiving a new pastor. Pastors and their families found out at the same time as parishioners that they were going to move and in a matter of two weeks the pastor and family were in a new community. Fortunately, I have never experienced a pastoral change in that way, but at one time, that is how it was done.

Even though we are still in an itinerate system, currently, appointments are done in a more collaborative way. The church, the pastor and the Bishop all have input into the process. Even though an appointment is made on an annual basis, the average length of an appointment is normally 3-5 years. In my case I am in my 18th year in Monticello which is highly unusual. A succession plan is also highly unusual. The primary reason I have been allowed to stay this long and the primary reason I believe the Bishop has supported our succession plan has been missional. We have consistently had ministry goals that were best supported by consistent senior pastor leadership in our congregation.

Pastor Justin has been on staff at MUMC since 2017. He understands our mission and our congregation. The consistency and stability he brings will help the congregation to continue moving forward.

Pastor Justin and I have been working very collaboratively for many months. We are already beginning to shift responsibilities and are seeking to do so in such a way that it is a very smooth and natural transition.

On March 11, 2024, the Bishop made it official, Pastor Justin will assume the title and role of senior pastor on July 1, 2024. Because of the type of transition we are making, I do not believe you will see any radical changes come July 1, but Pastor Justin's authority and responsibilities will change. He will not necessarily take over all my roles, but he will continue to work in his areas of strength and passion.

I will remain on staff as the Pastor Emeritus until June 30, 2025. We do not know the details of what the staff will look like at that point, but the staff will be shaped and developed around the jobs and tasks that need to be accomplished.

This continues to be an exciting time of ministry at the Monticello United Methodist Church. I look forward to seeing how God will continue to move in the life and ministry of our congregation.

GENERAL CONFERENCE 2020

Yes, that is correct, the 2020 General Conference of the United Methodist Church will be meeting in Charlotte, North Carolina on April 23-May 3, 2024. General Conference is a meeting of United Methodists from around the world who meet every four years to set goals and make decisions for the denomination. The General Conference is made up of just under 900 lay and clergy delegates from around the world. Despite all the people who claim to speak for the United Methodist Church, General Conference is the only body who can speak on behalf of the denomination.

The reason this is referred to as the 2020 General Conference is because the 2020 General Conference was delayed multiple times because of COVID-19. The items on the agenda are supposed to be the items that were already on the agenda for the 2020 General Conference. Because of the global nature of the delegates in attendance it has been difficult to get the conference rescheduled.

It seems that things have been quiet in the way of news and controversies in recent months, but the closer we get to General Conference, the more likely you are to hear about issues and controversies that will be coming before the General Conference delegates. I would encourage you to become educated and aware of the issue, but I would caution you about believing everything you hear.

There are common sense proposals and there are proposals that some would consider radical that will be considered by the General Conference delegates. Anything you hear before April 29 will only have the status of being a proposal. The first week of General Conference they meet in legislative groups and it is in the second week that they take up issues as an entire body. They do their business in a similar way that our congress does their business (and yes, that includes gridlock).

When it comes to controversial items, there will always be someone putting their spin on a decision that has been made. Before getting too emotional about anything you see in the news or online, let me encourage you to wait until more clarifying information is made available which will happen in the next few weeks after General Conference.

One of the major proposals is to allow the United Methodist Churches in the United States to remain a part of the global denomination but have our own Book of Disciple reflecting cultural values that may be different from cultural values in other parts of the world. If General Conference passes that proposal, it will be considered a constitutional change. A constitutional change does not take effect until it receives a 2/3 majority vote from annual conferences around the world. Not all decisions are considered constitutional, so all decisions do not need a 2/3 vote from the annual conferences around the world, but some may need further approval. Constitutional changes will not go into effect until it receives the required 2/3 majority vote.

Even though the General Conference may speak for the denomination, ministry happens in the local church. It has been my experience that the decisions of General Conference have little impact on the local church. My expectation is that no matter what happens at General Conference, the Monticello United Methodist Church will continue to reach out in love to our community who not only reside physically in the Monticello area, but they also connect with us online from around the world. Please keep the General Conference and delegates in your prayers.


IN REMEMBERENCE

- -The Salvation Army brought in a few officers who coordinated and oversaw the relief center, but most of the workers came from the local community. High School students at the time remember spending every day at the church sorting clothing by size for families in need. In addition to the meals served at the church, there were canned food, non-perishable food and personal hygiene items that were distributed at the church. There were people sleeping on cots and even some child-care that was provided.
- -The church also became a place where people would come to sit around and tell their experiences and stories. There was no formal counseling provided, but the church became a place where there were patient and compassionate listening ears who did what they could to help with the emotional recovery of our community.
- -The church had made plans to launch a radio ministry, the target start date of broadcasting the church service may have been Easter Sunday which was just 11 days away, but a dedicated phone line had been run between the church and the local radio station just days before the tornado. The radio station was damaged in the tornado and so the church became a place where the local radio station could broadcast until the station was repaired. This communication on the local radio station was so important during the time of recovery.
- -Palm Sunday was on April 7. The church and downtown still did not have electricity, but they met for worship. The Presbyterian Church building was not available as a place to meet because of the damage their building incurred, so the United Methodists invited the Presbyterians to join them for worship on that morning and their pastor shared in the service with the United Methodist pastor. There was standing room only as those gathered sang at the top of their lungs. It was on that morning, April 7, 1974 that our radio outreach began. Since there was no power, the organ could not be used, so a second piano was rolled into the sanctuary from the choir room. The sanctuary piano was located by the stained glass window that had been broken out. Even though they thought all the glass had been cleaned up, when the pianist played, she discovered that there were shards of glass between the keys and she experienced small cuts on her fingers that caused her hands to bleed.
- -After about 3 weeks, most students returned to school, but because of the damage to some of the school buildings, they needed alternative places to meet. Our church was one of at least 3 churches that housed students. Our building was used mainly for junior high aged students. Instead of students moving from class to class, in many cases it was the teachers that moved around. Some desks that could be salvaged from the school was brought in for students, but one teacher remembers her students sitting in the elementary sized chairs from the church's classrooms. The last 4 weeks of the school year involved shortened school days, but students were served lunch each day. Once again, our church kitchen was used. Hundreds of meals were prepared each day and then transported to various locations where the students were meeting.
- -During the time of community recovery, there was an evening when the high school band was rehearsing in Jacob's Well, there was a church meeting in the old parlor, a wedding rehearsal and a funeral visitation all happening in the church building at the same time and no one complained. They all did what they needed to do and the church was a place that brought the community together.

Rev. Helm said that the church never locked its doors for many weeks because there was always something going on in the building. Our church building became an important hub for the community as it recovered. No one would ever choose to go through such a disaster, but our community is stronger because of it. As we look back, we are thankful for the ways the community came together. As we look forward, may it be a motivator for us to care for one another and to reach out in love.
